

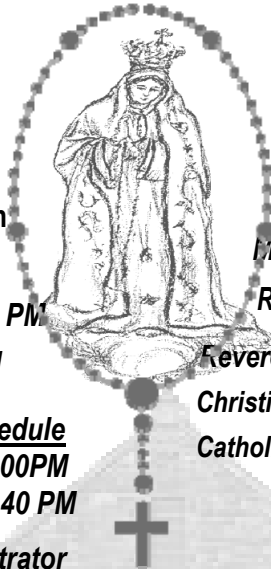

The Parish Family of Our Lady of Fatima will celebrate Christmas Mass on Christmas Day at 10:30 AM.

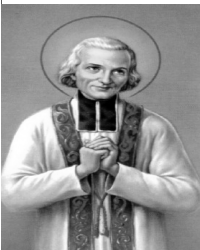
We are asking all members of the Parish to please do whatever they can to join Our Parish Family on Christmas Day. Remember, **“The parish that prays together stays together”**.

Jubilee Year of Mercy

This past Tuesday, December 8th, the Church officially opened the JUBILEE OF MERCY. The year of grace will close on November 20, 2016. At all Masses on the Holy Day of the Immaculate Conception, we prayed prayers to welcome in the Holy Year. The focus of the year will be the corporal and spiritual works of mercy. The Parish is gifting each family with a magnet to hang in your homes that contains the Corporal Works of Mercy and the Spiritual Works of Mercy. A suggestion is to choose one of these works for a week or a month, and be engaged at bringing the mercy of God to others by enfleshing that particular work of mercy.

Also, the Parish is gifting each family with a prayer card containing the official logo of the Year of Mercy and the official prayer of mercy for the Jubilee. The official logo shows the God of mercy carrying us on his back. Jesus is the Shepherd who seeks us out and showers his mercy upon us. Please keep this prayer card handy at home and pray the prayer regularly throughout the year.

And throughout the Jubilee Year of Mercy, the Universal Prayer (General Intercessions) at Sunday Mass will end with everyone praying the prayer for mercy, found on the card in your Missalette.

Scripture Reflections

There can be no mistaking the message of the prophet Zephaniah to the people of Israel. The phrases, "shout for joy," "sing joyfully," and "be glad and exult" are delivered as commands to the people because "the king of Israel, the LORD, is in your midst." This Third Sunday of Advent, once referred to as "Gaudete Sunday," is the Sunday to rejoice. Zephaniah makes it clear that the reason for rejoicing rests in the action of God on behalf of God's own people. Their enemies have been defeated and there will be no more "misfortune to fear." This same message brings us comfort. Paul from his prison cell wrote to the Philippians telling them to "Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, Rejoice." Not because Paul had the things of this world but because God was with him in his prison cell as he wrote to the Philippian church. Paul, in light of his encounter and life with the risen Lord, asked that joy be placed at the center of the Christian life, encouraging the Philippians to live their lives in gentleness, without worry or fear, because the Lord, who had come, was coming again.

The text from Luke's Gospel is one of the longer passages not centered on a teaching of Jesus, but of John the Baptist. Three different groups--the crowds, the tax collectors, and the soldiers--are responding to John's warning in the previous verse that any tree not producing good fruit will be thrown into the fire. In today's readings we hear only their questions and John's answers, group by group. Note that John does not tell them to change their vocation or profession; instead he tells them that they need to change the way they act as soldiers, or tax collectors, or members of their community. They are to express their repentance by being more compassionate, considerate, and honest in all they do. Now willing to do these things, they are filled with great expectation; they are ready to welcome the one that John announces. This is good news, a promise of joy to the people who will hear God's call and await the Messiah's coming. We are the people being prepared to rejoice always.

• Would you describe yourself as a joyful person? Do others see you as someone filled with joy? This third week of Advent share some joy with others.

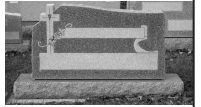

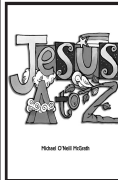
